Dear Parents,

This year the incoming third grade students are being **assigned** a summer reading book, **Freckle Juice** by **Judy Blume**. The story is about a boy who wants freckles more than anything else. After reading this book, the students have a choice on the art project. They may draw and **color** a picture of their favorite part of the story (preferably on cardstock or small poster board) **or** create a shoebox diorama. They are to write a paragraph *explaining their favorite part* and *why* it is their favorite. Bring in the picture/diorama and the paragraph on the first day of school. **Be prepared to give an oral presentation describing why you chose that scene.**

Using the reading list (found on the school website), third graders should read a book a day or at least one book a week throughout the summer depending on the length of the book. Schedule an hour to spend indoors reading quietly each day. Your child also needs to spend at least **10 minutes a day reading aloud** to you to practice expression and work on fluency. Normally, books for oral reading should be easier those read in the classroom. **Children who do not read during the summer actually loose reading skills and will have trouble keeping up in September.**

Getting your children and books together – a few ideas:

1. Read Yourself! Let your children see you read.
2. Read what your children are reading.
3. Turn off the TV & PUT DOWN THE ELECTRONICS! Set aside time for each family member to read and enjoy.
4. Read aloud as a family. Your children's librarian at your local library branch will be happy to help you select books your entire family will enjoy.
5. Talk about the books you are reading.
6. Visit your local public library regularly. Help your children select books; ask the librarian for help when you need it. Take advantage of the programs offered.
7. Show that books are special; give them as gifts.
8. Relate books to family activities and events--a vacation trip, a new pet, visiting a museum, etc. Mary Quattlebaum has written Underground Train about a trip on Metro's Red Line.

REMEMBER: The public library offers many services, and they are **free** of charge!

Keep looking for books that have won the Caldecott Medal and other books by the same illustrators. You are old enough now to appreciate the art work more than when you were listening to the story in kindergarten and first grade.

BIOGRAPHIES

You will be reading biographies next year. Ask the librarian to show you where they are kept and see if there are any lives of famous people that interest you. The d'Aulaires' books on Columbus, Pocahontas, George Washington, Abraham Lincoln and Buffalo Bill are gorgeous! Alice Dalgleish's The Columbus Story is fun to compare with the d'Aulaires'. Jean Fritz has written Where Do You Think You're Going, Christopher Columbus? to give you another look at this famous man. Many new books were written to celebrate the 500th anniversary of his voyage. The public library should have some of them. Jean Fritz has also written many other biographies with a question in the title, What's the Big Idea, Ben Franklin?, Who's that Stepping on Plymouth Rock? and others. David Adler has also written some wonderful biographies on Benjamin Franklin, Martin Luther King, Jr., and John F. Kennedy, just to name a few. Look for the Who Was...? series of biographies. The public library uses JB on the spine label to tell you that this is a biography for children. Remember this is the only place in the library that the books are not arranged by the author's last name.

Biographies are arranged by the subject (the person the book is about.) For example, all books on George Washington are together under Washington - *JB WAS*.
